The Room Where It Happens:

Session talks about re-opening the church building

Last month I wrote up a "Session Synopsis" in which I tried to share with you some of the ideas and issues the session had wrestled with during our June meeting. This month, I'm doing the same thing, only I'm using this space instead.

During our July 14 meeting, we had two big conversations. The first item of discussion is not yet ready for public release but the second one is: the search for a "metric" of when we will feel safe to re-open the church building for worship, small group use, and public use.

It was a wide-ranging conversation, and we considered many factors as we tried to develop a set of criteria that had to be met in order to reopen. Those factors include:

- \cdot the health and wellness of church members and staff, the children in our daycare and preschool programs, and the community at large
- the quality of "Zoom"-style worship as a replacement for in-person worship as the weeks and months pass
- the rise or decline in Covid-19 cases in and around our area
- the impacts of the pandemic on the future of the church and its ministries
- concern that certain members have become disconnected from the life of the church because they are not attending online fellowship and worship

Suffice it to say that there were no easy answers. Even the prospect of an eventual upgrade to a "Phase Five" status for Southern Illinois will not guarantee that it is safe enough for us to reopen. (That would be a positive step, though!)

So, we have decided to continue as we are with the Zoom fellowship and worship on Sundays. We will revisit the issues of potential re-opening again this month (August) and perhaps for months to come. But we take the health of our members, staff, and community very seriously.

We are very grateful that many of you are attending worship online faithfully, and that giving remains relatively strong.* The various ministry teams are also meeting and discussing new and creative ways to carry out mission, do faith development, and keep the work of the church going.

And please know that we have folks in the congregation who have the technical knowledge to help you connect with the Sunday online worship (either live or recorded). Do not hesitate to contact the church office or one of the session members to ask for a little help. Chances are, if you have internet service or if you know someone with a cellphone, we can get you connected with the Sunday service. You do **not** need to miss worshiping with your church friends and family.

Snider Hill Donations

Snider Hill Cemetery was founded by one of our church founders, William Richart. Because the church does not own Snider Hill, and it is considered a private cemetery by the City of Carbondale (and therefore, not maintained by the City), the landscape and gravestone maintenance of the cemetery is sporadic.

Small Groups Ministry has tried to support the cause of the cemetery with both research efforts as well as periodic mowing and weed trimming in parts of the cemetery where we know Presbyterian Church members are buried or where we know there are family connections. In 2018 the church

> received a donation from a family member of one of the other families who care for their parts of Snider Hill. With this seed money, designated (in Special Gifts, line 8106) the fund for Snider Hill Cemetery maintenance was established.

This article is a reminder that you may designate offerings, memorial gifts, and bequests to this fund in support of our Snider Hill efforts. In the future, these monies may be used for landscape services such as mowing and string trimming, or to reimburse expenses such as gasoline and mower depreciation submitted by a private provider of these services during our workdays.

The annual **Per Capita assessment** reflects member congregations' commitment to the Presbyterian Church (USA) and its presbyteries and synods. This annual per member apportionment is the primary source of funding for the PC(USA) Office of the General Assembly (OGA), which "makes possible numerous services upon which Presbyterians depend" (from www.pcusa.org).

Did you know ...?

- The 2020 Per Capita assessment is \$42 per each household church member; First Presbyterian Church pays Per Capita on all its members, based on prior years' membership rolls.
- Per Capita giving is separate from (and generally not included in) recurring pledge commitments. *As you are financially able*, if you can cover some, or all of this expense, the church may then devote more budget funds to our mission and worship ministries, and to facility maintenance.

Can't recall if you've already paid your 2020 Per Capita? E-mail Barb Stewart at office@firstprescdale. org and she'll check her records. (Please allow awhile for Barb to respond, since she must check this information from the church office.)

As J. Herbert Nelson II, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the PC(USA) affirmed, "Per capita is crucial to the overall health of the PC(USA), because it binds presbyteries, synods, and congregations together in one church." Through Per Capita giving, "Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of moving the church forward in the 21st century" (www.oga.pcusa.org). Welcome Back to the Children and Staff of the Daycare






